Justin S. Cetas, MD, PhD 1970 – 2022

JUSTIN S. CETAS was born on October 3, 1970. Dr. Cetas was an undergraduate in the great books program at St. John's College in Santa Fe, New Mexico, where he developed a lifelong interest in philosophical approaches and a habit of asking deep questions about the thorniest problems, whether they be in neurosurgery, neuroscience, leadership, or life. Dr. Cetas then completed an M.D.-Ph.D. degree at the University of Arizona College of Medicine in Tucson, before joining the neurosurgical residency program at Oregon Health & Science University.

At OHSU, Dr. Cetas continued an intense interest in basic neurophysiology, concentrating on neurovascular regulation in stroke, headache and other clinical entities. He was a fabulous scientific mentor to a long line of medical students, neurosurgical residents, and graduate students. His pioneering work on eicosanoid cerebrovascular regulation was funded by a VA Merit Award.

Dr. Cetas also rose in leadership within the department, taking on roles as Chief of Neurosurgery at the Portland VA Medical Center, surgical director of the OHSU Pituitary Center, residency program director, and Vice-chair for Education. Throughout this time, he remain dedicated to and focused on his wife Alivia Thompson Cetas and his four children. He was also an avid outdoorsman, beekeeper, and fly fisherman. Always willing to sit for a coffee or a drink and an avid conversationalist, Dr. Cetas was beloved by trainees, colleagues, and friends.

Dr. Cetas was highly valued by the residents at OHSU and was a strong champion for resident wellness. He established an alumni resident wellness fund and initiated a weekend resident retreat at the beginning of each academic year. The department has announced that the annual resident retreat will be permanently named for Dr. Cetas.

17 months before his death, Dr. Cetas was selected in a national search as the new Chair of neurological surgery at his alma mater, the University of Arizona Health Sciences Center in Tucson. He made great strides in that role for 12 months preceding his untimely death.

Paul L. Kornblith, MD 1938 – 2022

PAUL L. KORNBLITH was born January 15, 1938, in Philadelphia, PA. His precocious intellect allowed him to skip two years in school, graduate at 16 from Central High School, and head early to Temple University and then Jefferson Medical College. Upon graduation, he served two years active duty in the US Army, one stationed in Korea and one in Valley Forge Medical Hospital. This was followed by his being Director of Clinical Neuro Oncology at Mass General, Clinical Director at the NINCDS and teaching at Harvard Medical School.

His passion for knowledge and research then led him to NIH, where he was Chief of Surgical Neurology, followed by a move to NY to be a professor and Chairman of Neurosurgery at Albert Einstein College of Medicine and Montefiore Medical Center.

After his next appointment as a professor and vice chairman at University of Pittsburgh Cancer Institute and Medical Center, he launched his second career as an entrepreneur in the field of biotechnology, founding Precision Therapeutics, serving as advisor at Pittsburgh Life Sciences Greenhouse, as the Exec Officer and chairman of several other companies and as an adjunct professor of Pitt's School of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences.

A gifted writer, he wrote 4 books, several chapters in other's books and over 140 scholarly papers that will inform future generations of doctors and scientists. While still in medical school, his study and sketches of the abdominal wall and intestines were used as a basis for art in the Netter Collection of Medical Illustrations, a standard reference in the medical field. He was fortunate to receive his training from some incredible mentors, and enjoyed becoming a mentor to many doctors and entrepreneurs looking to follow in his footsteps.

He was an avid toy train and antique tool collector, enjoyed listening to classical music, and had a love of reading about history and current events.

Dr. Paul Kornblith passed away January 10, 2023 in Austin, Texas. He is survived by his children, Nicholas Kornblith (Leslie) of Austin, TX, Robin Sneider (John) of Hartsdale, NY, Margot Carter (Phillip) of Arlington, VA and his grandchildren, Kai, Lana and Mara Kornblith, Marina and David Sneider and Sarah and Matthew Carter.

Robert E. Maxwell, MD, PhD 1936 – 2022

ROBERT E. MAXWELL was born in Lima, Ohio, on June 24, 1936, the son of James Daniel and Ida Cox Maxwell. He died July 28, 2022. He received his undergraduate and medical school education at The Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio and was a lifetime Ohio State basketball fan. In 1957, he was elected to the premedical honorary society, Alpha Epsilon Delta. He received his bachelor's degree in 1958. In 1960 he received the Nu Sigma Nu Outstanding Medical Student Award, in 1961 he was elected to Alpha Omega Alpha and received the M.D. degree cum laude in 1962. During medical school, he had the opportunity to work in the laboratory of Dr. Robert Zollinger and first learned operative techniques while constructing Heidenhain pouches for the study of gastric secretion and peptic ulcer disease. He then interned and had his general surgery residency training with Dr. Alfred Blalock at the Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, Maryland.

Upon completion of his general surgery training, Dr. Maxwell entered into military service and served two years as a Captain in the U.S. Army medical Corp. This experience stimulated his interest in surgery of the nervous system, and inspired him to pursue a career in neurosurgery. He joined the training program at the University of Minnesota under Dr. Lyle French and an outstanding young faculty including Shelley Chou, Jim Story, and Don Long. Dr. Maxwell took graduate level courses in the neurosciences, taught gross anatomy and neuroanatomy to freshman medical students and as graduate student investigated the histological, ultrastructural, and biochemical effects of glucorticoids on experimental models of vasogenic and cytotoxic brain edema. He received the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1974. That same year, he was certified by the ABNS and became a fellow in the ACS. Dr. Maxwell joined the faculty of the University of Minnesota in 1971 and served as Chairman of the Section of Neurosurgery at the Minneapolis Veterans Administration Hospital. He served as Chief of the Medical Staff at the University Hospital and Clinic from 1989-1994 and on the University of Minnesota Physicians Board of Directors. In 1995 he was appointed Head of the Department of Neurosurgery and held that position until December of 2003. He guided the department through difficult times related to the onslaught of managed care in the Twin Cities and legal difficulties of the Department of Surgery.

His more than 100 publications reflect his research and clinical interests in cerebral edema, epilepsy, movement disorders, and pain. In particular he was integral to pioneering early work in magnetic resonance imaging (MRI)-guided deep brain stimulation and the Medtronic Navigus stereotactic system. He has served as president of the Society of University Neurosurgeons and President of the Minnesota Neurosurgical Society. In 1993, he received the Distinguished Alumnus Award of The Ohio State University.

Dr. Maxwell's general approach to neurosurgery was consistent with his approach to people. In order to treat a condition, one must first understand it. In order to help someone - whether a patient, peer, employee, or trainee one must first understand them. The social history was the most important part of the patient encounter. He knew that learning about a person takes time. There are no shortcuts or multitasking or efficiencies when it comes to building human relationships. His trainees could be forgiven for missing a clinical detail, but not knowing a patient's employment or relationship status or living circumstances was a cardinal mistake. In order to build those human relationships, he also learned and then taught that he must reveal, even share a part of himself. As such, an intended quick minute with him invariably took much longer. "Max," as he was affectionately known among his trainees (never to his face, of course) was not an alter ego of a man who could somehow inject stories of his beloved Ohio State Buckeyes into any neurosurgical discussion. Neurosurgery was simply an offshoot, a manifestation, of his true goal, the goal of many philosophers - to understand people and their human condition. As a neurosurgical philosopher, he insisted that his trainees conduct themselves in a certain order, an order if disrupted can be perilous - "Gentlemen/Lady first, physician second, neurosurgeon last."

He frequently acknowledged the loving support of his parents, wife Karen, and four children: David, Laura, James, and Carter.

Edward R. Seljeskog, MD, PhD 1934 – 2022

EDWARD R. SELJESKOG was born in Minneapolis, MN, on August 24, 1934. He was the second of three children to Sigsbee Raymond Seljeskog and Jennie (Markuson) Seljeskog. The son of a physician-chemist, Ed went on to matriculate at the University of Minnesota with a BA, BS, and MD degree. He earned a PhD during his neurosurgical training in Minneapolis under Lyle French and William Peyton.

He left a huge mark on the training of generations of neurosurgical residents at the University of Minnesota for nearly 40 years, achieving the rank of Professor and Vice Chair, and Head of the Division of Neurosurgery at Hennepin County Medical Center from 1968 to 1976.

The son of a Bronze Star WW II Army Medical Officer, Dr. Seljeskog achieved the rank of Captain in the Medical Corps of the US Naval Reserves. He participated in Desert Storm, and also served as Reserve Neurosurgery Advisor to the Surgeon General of the US Navy for 6 years. In further service to the military, Ed spent nearly 4 decades as a consulting neurosurgeon at the Minneapolis VA hospital, and later at the Ft. Meade, South Dakota VA hospital, finally retiring at age 84. His patriotism and sense of respect for veterans was kindled early in his life in the Boy Scouts of America, where he achieved the rank of Eagle Scouts and was awarded the National Distinguished Eagle Scout Award in 2005.

Ed served as visiting professor at many institutions, authored a number of neurosurgical chapters and articles in the scientific literature, and served organized neurosurgery in a number of roles including Director, Secretary and Vice-Chair of the ABNS, President of the AANS, and Neurosurgery Advisory Board Member, Governor, and Regent of the American College of Surgeons.

After a remarkable academic career, Ed transitioned to the private practice of neurosurgery and became a scion of the community in Rapid City, South Dakota, practicing there from 1993 until 2018. Though remembered by trainees as a somewhat 'crusty, Norwegian surgeon,' they knew Ed had a heart of gold and was a devoted husband, father, and grandfather. He is survived by his wife Peg, 4 children, and many grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Frederick A. Simeone, MD

1936 - 2022

FREDERICK A. SIMEONE was born on June 8th, 1936, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Following his education at Temple University School of Medicine he completed residencies at the Mayo Clinic and the University of Pennsylvania. He joined the full-time faculty at Harvard Medical School, where he did research and practiced neurosurgery under the tutelage of Drs. William Sweet and Vernon Mark. He was called back to Philadelphia by Dr. Thomas Langfitt to become Chairman at Pennsylvania Hospital.

While at Pennsylvania Hospital, he developed a large neurosurgical service and a residency program characterized by strong clinical activity and research. Both while at Harvard and at the University of Pennsylvania, his principal early research interests were the study and treatment of cerebral vasospasm. He produced the first experimental model of prolonged experimental vasospasm while at Harvard, and subsequently he carried this research to more basic areas at the University of Pennsylvania.

Fred was truly an icon of Penn Medicine, the city of Philadelphia, and the national neurosurgical community. As a academic neurosurgeon, Fred simply excelled; he drew patients from far and wide and was one of the most prolific neurosurgeons in the nation. He was loved by his patients and colleagues alike, and was a highly impactful educator of neurosurgical residents. He carried out original research on cerebral vasospasm and published widely on a broad array of neurosurgical topics. The textbook on spine surgery that he co-authored with orthopedic surgeon Dr. Richard Rothman was the standard in the field for many years and across multiple editions. Fred was an elected member of both the Society of Neurological Surgeons and the American Academy of Neurological Surgeons, and his biography from the former is attached below.

He also held the rare distinction of being an outstanding physician who also excelled in an area outside of medicine, as he was perhaps the leading sports car collector in the world. The Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum will stand as a lasting legacy to this important facet of Fred's remarkable life, just as the robust neurosurgery service at Pennsylvania Hospital will remain a testament to his impressive achievements as a neurosurgeon and physician-leader.

He was a member of the AANS, AACNS, CNS, and ACS. He collected racing sports cars and has a historical automobile library destined to be part of a foundation dedicated to the concepts of automotive design and safety. He has one daughter who has just completed college and who is looking for new worlds to conquer.

SNS PROFESSIONALISM POLICY

INTRODUCTION

The SNS has unique organizational qualities derived from serving as the representative society for residency program directors and academic department chairs of neurological surgery. This requires the highest standards for professional conduct appropriate to set an example in the education of future neurosurgeons and to avoid conflicts of interest amongst neurosurgical educators.

On July 26, 2018, the SNS proposed that the One Neurosurgery Summit create a Professionalism Task Force representing the Summit organizations. This task force developed the One Neurosurgery Summit Professionalism and Harassment Model Policy. The intention was that each organization would then utilize and adapt the model policy as required for the special characteristics of its own organization, membership, and By-Laws. The following policies utilize the same definitions included in the One Neurosurgery Summit Professionalism and Harassment Model Policy.

POLICY

- 1. Participants of any SNS or SNS sponsored event will not engage in any behavior that will undermine or interfere with the goals and purposes of the event including, but not limited to:
 - 1.1. The use of offensive or insensitive language or behavior;
 - 1.2. The use of denigrating comments based on race, national or ethnic origin, color, religion, age, sex, sexual orientation, gender or disability; or
 - 1.3. Harassment, threatening behavior or similar intimidation, or assault of other participants.
- The SNS endorses a Code of Conduct that requires equal and respectful treatment of others, nonharassment, and non-retaliation, as well as ethical and professional behavior in the conduct of patient care and other professional activities.
 - 2.1. All participants of any SNS event will sign an acknowledgment of willingness to adhere to the meeting policy regarding harassment.
 - 2.2. All SNS members and SNS event participants will be provided this Code of Conduct at the time of event registration and the Code of Conduct will be posted on the event site and in the appropriate location on the SNS website.
 - 2.3. The SNS will also review the submission of any finding by a relevant professional body of unethical or unprofessional behavior by an SNS member in the conduct of patient care or other professional activities. Such professional bodies include but are not limited to state medical boards and licensing agencies, the medical executive committee of the hospital at which the member practices, the American Board

- of Neurological Surgery, and/or the American Association of Neurological Surgeons (AANS) Professional Conduct Program.
- The SNS will provide a specific mechanism for reporting conduct that violates the Code of Conduct that will be easily accessed by all members and event participants.
 - 3.1. Any urgent or emergent issues will be addressed by calling 911.
 - 3.2. Any immediately threatening issues will be addressed by calling 911 or other authorities (police).
 - 3.3. A mechanism for protecting the identify of any individual reporting conduct that violates the Code
 - 3.4. Investigation and adjudication will be through a special task force appointed by the President of the SNS to include the Secretary (who will serve as Chair), the President-Elect and 3 additional SNS members in good standing. If the alleged violation relates to diversity or gender, then the task force will make every effort to include representation from that community.
 - 3.5. Accused members will be given the opportunity to make a written or oral statement to the special task force before any task force recommendations are made.
 - 3.6. The Task Force will collect preliminary information from pertinent individuals in written form and then within 3 months make a preliminary recommendation to the Executive Council.
 - 3.7. Where appropriate, the SNS President may additionally or alternatively refer concerns



- for review by an appropriate external body, including but not limited to the AANS Professional Conduct Program.
- 3.8. The SNS Task Force and/or a delegated review body will share findings and make recommendations for action to the SNS Executive Council (SNS Bylaws, Article II, Section B.6).
- 3.9. An accused member, who after full review and recommendation by the special task force is subject to action by the SNS Executive Council, may request the opportunity to submit a written appeal. The Council will review appeals and provide timely responses to accused members.
- 4. Code of Conduct violation reports should be directed through regular or electronic mail or by telephone to an SNS officer, or through submission of an online complaint form. The online complaint form will be present on the SNS website and a link to it will be included in Code of Conduct materials distributed at SNS events.
- 5. The SNS will develop or obtain educational material with review required for all Executive Committee members, committee chairs, course directors and holders of other leadership positions prior to assuming duties. Repeat training will be required every 5 years for individuals with ongoing SNS leadership roles.
- 6. Individuals reporting Code of Conduct Violations will be protected in the same manner as all reporters and whistleblowers:
 - 6.1. Individuals will be protected from retaliation for reporting in good faith behavior or information which the individual reasonably believes is a violation of this policy.
 - 6.2. To the extent appropriate, the host organizations will endeavor to keep complaints, investigations and any findings related thereto confidential.
- 7. The SNS will designate one member of the Annual Meeting Program Committee (or equivalent for other SNS events) to monitor the content of all presentations for compliance with the Code of Conduct. The Chair of the Committee on Resident Education the CoRE subcommittee chairs will serve the same role for SNS curricular materials under their purview.
 - 7.1. The relevant event planning committee will review possible Code of Conduct violations.

- 7.2. The event planning committee will report to the violation to the SNS President and Secretary with a recommendation for an appropriate course of action to include:
 - 7.2.1. Letter of information;
 - 7.2.2. Letter of reprimand;
 - 7.2.3. Temporary removal from participation in SNS events in a leadership or teaching capacity;
 - 7.2.4. Or permanent removal from participation in SNS events in a leadership or teaching capacity
- 7.3. Two thirds of the voting members of the SNS Executive Committee may approve final recommendations for action.
- 7.4. This process will be completed within 6 months of each SNS event.
- 8. SNS event planning committees will evaluate all social components of educational events to assure their suitability, promote standards of professionalism, and reduce risk for violation of the Code of Conduct:
 - 8.1. Special attention will be given to social events involving alcohol where residents or junior neurosurgeons directly interact with senior neurosurgeons.
 - 8.2. Duration of events and the availability of alcohol should be assessed as reasonable for the purpose of the event.
 - 8.3. Alcohol will only be available with the concurrent provision of food.
 - 8.4. Event planning committees should include information about associated social components for approval by the SNS Executive Committee.
- 9. Guests at any SNS event (speakers, spouses, etc.) will be held to the Code of Conduct as SNS members and may be barred by the SNS Executive Committee from future guest participation.
- 10. This policy will be reviewed every 5 years after adoption.
- 11. Article 11
 - 11.1 Reports of individual incidents occurring at SNS sponsored events must be made within 30 days of the event. Other reports of professional conduct violations may be made at any time.
